New PGM for Down

Following the sudden and tragic demise of the late R.W.Bro. John F Kerr in December 2002, the new Provincial Grand Master, R.W.Bro. Robert J Armstrong was Invested and Installed on Saturday 29th March 2003 by the Grand Master, at a special meeting of the Provincial Grand Lodge of Down held in the Conference Centre, Balmoral, Belfast. The Grand Master was accompanied by the Deputy Grand Master, R.W.Bro. George Dunlop and the Assistant Grand Master, R.W.Bro. William Mawhinney. In addition, the meeting was also attended by a considerable number of distinguished Brethren representing all disciplines within The Order.

The Installation Ceremony was well supported with in excess of 600 Brethren attending.

At the same meeting, R.W.Bro. Robert Armstrong installed his Deputy, R.W.Bro. Cecil D Burns, who is the current Grand Lodge Director of Ceremonies.

Subsequently, at a quarterly Stated Communication held on Saturday 10th May in Downpatrick, the Provincial Grand Master invested and installed R.W.Bro. Robert W J H McMurray as Provincial Assistant Grand Master, thereby replacing R.W.Bro. Ian G Ritchie, who had with regret, to retire from his post through pressure of business commitments.

A Travelling Gavel was crafted by a Mason from New South Wales, Australia and having moved across many parts of the Masonic world, arrived in Culmore Lodge No. 320 in October 2002 from Victory Lodge 522 Killybegs, Donegal. It was then suggested that it be taken to Cork. Although some were a little sceptical about the long journey, a coach party including 22 Brethren and 19 of their ladies set off from Londonderry to make the 300 mile journey on Thursday 9th January 2003.

The journey turned out to be quite pleasant with a number of stops along the way including Donegal Town and Oranmore in Co. Galway. We arrived in Cork around 6 p.m. and during the evening a number of Brethren from Shamrock Lodge No. 27 including the PGM of Munster, R.W. Bro. Alan Campbell, accompanied by his wife and daughter, came along to welcome us. The PGM did us a great honour and spoke with everyone on an individual basis and made us very welcome indeed.

Famous Old Boy Reaches Masonic Milestone

At the Festive Board of the W. E. Scott Memorial Lodge No. 554, Campsie, Londonderry, W.Bro. Scott Huey (a famous Irish International Cricketer) was presented with his 50 year jewel.

A native of Ture near Muff, Co. Donegal, he was one of Ireland's most accomplished left arm slow bowlers. He was taught his cricket at The Masonic Boys' School Dublin where he played in several Leinster Schools Cup-finals. He subsequently returned to the North West and achieved great success with Eglinton which he joined in 1948 winning both league and cup medals.

Due to many work commitments he only won 36 Irish caps (captain 5 times) but among his many achievements was a match winning 8 for 46 v MCC in 1954 (this was the first occasion an Irish bowler had taken 14 wickets in a first class match and meant Scott topped the English bowling averages for 1953). Other notable achievements were 10 for 28 v Donemana in 1961. He also was Captain of the North West on 24 occasions winning the inter-provincial title on several occasions.

W.Bro. Huey was W.M. in 1979 and served as Steward of Charities for many years. His jewel and certificate were presented by R.W.Bro. Billy Manning (PAGM) who reminded him of times playing hockey together and paid tribute to his exceptional all-round sportsmanship describing him as a true gentleman and example to all Freemasons.

Questions over Masonic One-Day Classes in North America

The June Issue of Grand Lodge News carried an article regarding "an aggressive membership drive" in North America.

At the recent Annual Conference of Grand Secretaries of North America, held in Minneapolis on 15-19 February 2003, one of the major topics discussed, concerned the "one-day classes" which some Grand Lodges in the United States have held to initiate, pass and raise, in one-day, several thousand Freemasons in a mass ceremony. Such ceremonies have recently been held in Ohio and Indiana; the Grand Lodge of New York has planned one for the end of March.

The conference was told that these events were not as successful as the organisers had hoped; figures suggested that the dropout rate after the ceremonies was reaching 82%. In consequence, Grand Lodges are questioning whether the huge administrative effort involved in organising such one-day classes is therefore worth it.

Others questioned whether this was the right way forward for Freemasonry: how can such events claim to create Freemasons? Are they creating Freemasons or just creating numbers?

There does seem to be a background of resistance to these events. Significantly, there is no evidence that those jurisdictions, which have held these mass ceremonies, are rushing to repeat them.


A delicious supper was served by W.Bro. Crummer's wife and daughter. Sadly, Mrs Crummer has since died after a short time in hospital.

When a Southport Freemason visited the Giant's Causeway in Northern Ireland he came across a piece of 125 year old Masonic graffiti.

Christopher J Brooks of West Lancashire Lodge No. 1403, was working in Ulster and during a day off paid a visit to the famous landmark. Seating himself on one of the perfectly formed hexagonal rocks to have a bite of lunch he saw, carved in the rock next to him, some graffiti dated 1878.

CHARITY CORNER

"Have wheels will travel"

In May 1996 a Down widow became an Annuitant of the Victoria Jubilee Masonic Benevolent Fund and continued to receive assistance until September 2001 when the Board of the Fund removed her name from the Register of Annuitants due to her higher than normal income level. Late in 2002 her local District Charity Committee were made aware of the very dramatic change in her circumstances. Due to ill health she had had both of her legs amputated.

Her Health Board had been unable to find her suitable accommodation in a Nursing Home and she returned to live in her own home and they assigned her four carers who looked after her daily needs.

Unfortunately this did result in her being confined to the downstairs of the house but with building adaptations she is now fully accommodated although wheelchair access can only be made through the back of the house using a ramp. Obviously security and other factors have had to be taken into account.

She is an intelligent and alert lady and is fortunate to have good friends and is

very involved in her local Church. She gets out occasionally with the assistance of friends or using transport provided by her Church. The location of her home being at the bottom of a hill adjacent to a major trunk road and with no shopping facilities at hand was also a relevant consideration in this case.

It was felt that she would have a lot more freedom if she had the use of an electric wheelchair, as she would be more independent. It was at this stage that an approach was made to both the Victoria Jubilee Masonic Benevolent Fund and the Masonic Welfare Fund both of whom were in a position to be of financial assistance. The local Charity Committee raised sufficient funds from various sources and has purchased an electric wheelchair, which she is currently using.

Due to these very sad circumstances the Board of the V.J. have reinstated her Annuity.

The Masonic Welfare Fund was launched by Grand Lodge in October 1996. It has steadily established itself as a Fund with a broad remit and would appeal to Lodges and Brethren
